
Hypnosis for Weight Management - Two Hour Seminar - July 25th, 2:00-4:00 pm at First Lutheran Church

Empty Bowls Report by Rachel Line



Hundred for Hunger by Nancy Eckert



Tour de Revs to Visit TACO on July 17th

The Tour de Revs will pass through our home stomping grounds at First Lutheran Church at 8:30 am on July 17th.

What is it? Combine three ELCA Pastors, one bamboo triplet bicycle, 65 cities and 13,000 miles of road, and the result is the Tour de Revs, a fundraiser for the ELCA World Hunger Appeal.

Starting on May 13, Pastors Fred "Fixed Gear" Soltow, Ron "The Slacker" Schlak, and David "The Tweeter" Twedt of the WV-WMD Synod began a 13,000-mile circuit of the country that will end at the Churchwide Assembly in Minneapolis on August 20th.

Over the course of the ride the three

of them hope to provide Revelation, Revolution and Revenue to each church and city they visit. Their goal is to raise \$5 million towards ELCA World Hunger's goal of raising \$25 million annually.

This effects TACO in two ways: first, as we have been a beneficiary of ELCA World Hunger in the past, Tour de Revs is riding to support the hungry right here at home as well.

Second, they'll be helping us serve our Friday meal at 8:30 am on July 17th. There will also be several presentations available:

-What are the realities of world hunger and what can we as Christians do?



-How does good stewardship relate to justice, poverty, health and wellness?
-What is a triplet bamboo bicycle and how do you ride that thing?

TACO Financial Update by Pastor Miller

It has been said that we are in the midst of a "perfect storm" (foundation giving down and people's needs up). This "perfect storm" is affecting so many people, in so many ways.

TACO has been buffeted by this storm, too. More people than ever come to our clinics, our food line, and many are in need of the host of services we provide.

While the "perfect storm" is raging, there, nevertheless is very good and encouraging news. Individual giving so far this year is up, amounting to \$25,260 or \$8,866 more than the same time last year. Many of you are being incredibly generous in these trying times!

Also, *Empty Bowls*, one of TACO's two major yearly fundraisers (*Sunset by the Sea* is the other), has raised \$12,064 this year or \$4,000 more than last year.

While these figures are heartening, they in no way indicate that the storm is subsiding. There is much more work to accomplish before we sleep. Our director, Jim Lovell, has said that we must rely on individual donations to maintain TACO staff at current levels beyond November.

This all could seem a very gloomy picture. We choose to think otherwise, however. Everyday, we see people receiving medical care, offered compassionate social work guidance, walked with until the day they die, fed warm meals twice a week, being outfitted with clean clothes and hygiene kits. God is good to us and those we serve. We pray that we might all keep the faith and confidently steer the course, trusting that God will lead us safely to the other side.

A Prayer for the Homeless

Ever-caring God, you who once came to this earth in Jesus and lived homeless among the people whom you love, help us to have compassion for the homeless among us. We know that it is painful to go to bed cold, hungry, and outcast, surviving only on scraps from the garbage and castoffs from the closets of the rich. You have taught us that bread alone is not enough, but we pray that bread might be sufficient for all, and that you would add all those other things necessary for life and well-being.
